

THE DEAN OF HEALTH SCIENCES AWARD 2019-20

Outstanding Contribution to **Teaching in Professional Practice**



> This award is an opportunity to recognise and celebrate the truly extraordinary contributions made by some of our colleagues in the clinical and allied healthcare settings.



The Dean of Health Sciences Award for Outstanding Contribution to Teaching in Professional Practice was developed to recognise the significant contribution of professionals who do not hold appointments with Trinity to the delivery of teaching to our undergraduate and postgraduate students. Each of the schools within the Faculty of Health Sciences has a long tradition of working with our clinical and allied health colleagues to educate students across all of our programmes, including Medicine, the Therapy programmes, Dental Science, Nursing, Midwifery and Pharmacy. Each of these programmes have unique clinical requirements, and involve complex and multi-faceted arrangements with our linked health service providers.

This award seeks to recognise the often unseen yet extremely valuable contribution of such colleagues and to highlight those exceptional individuals who excel in teaching and who continually encourage an ethos of excellence in clinical teaching.

Nominations were received from the schools, and I am pleased to grant four awards for 2019-20, across all schools in the Faculty.

Dr. P.J. Byrne graduated in Dentistry in 1982 from University College Cork and was awarded the Undergraduate Prize in Periodontology. He held various hospital appointments 1982 – 1988 in Ireland and UK, with his first post as a House Surgeon at the Dublin Dental University Hospital (DDUH) in July 1982. In 1990 he completed his MSc at the Eastman Dental Institute in Periodontology which was awarded with distinction from the University of London. He was awarded the Sir Wilfred Fish Research Prize by the British Society of Periodontology in 1990. In 1991, he was elected by examination F.D.S. Royal College of Surgeons, Edinburgh and F.F.D. Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland.

Since then, has been in referral practice in Dublin in Periodontology, Oral Surgery & Implant Dentistry, and lecturer in Periodontology, (1991-1996) initially teaching and lecturing to the undergraduate programme and from 1996 to present, to the Postgraduate Programme in Periodontology at Dublin Dental University Hospital, and Assistant Professor in Periodontology (Part-Time), Trinity College Dublin. He lectures widely Nationally and Internationally. He lectures widely nationally and internationally. He has a particular interest in risk factors associated with periodontal disease and the periodontal systemic interface.

Webb Ward, Tallaght University Hospital

The Webb Ward is named after Dr. Ella Webb who was lady district superintendent in the Alexandra College St John's Ambulance Brigade from 1914, and was on duty during the Easter Rising. During the conflict she set up an emergency hospital in Merrion Square to deal with the wounded. For her bravery during this time she was made a Lady of Grace of the Order of St John of Jerusalem (1916), and later awarded an MBE.

Today the Webb Ward is a 31 bed medical ward specialising in haematology, oncology medicine and palliative end of life care. We support patients and their families through difficult and challenging journeys, aimed at maximising recovery and quality of life.

The Nursing service philosophy on Webb Ward is to provide excellence in nursing practice through patient centred care and supportive teamwork. We aim to work with our patients, families and each other within a sensitive, caring and safe environment

Evelyn is the Pharmacy Education and Research Manager at Tallaght University Hospital (TUH) and an Adjunct Assistant Professor with the Trinity School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences. Evelyn graduated with a B.Sc. (Pharm) in 1991 and M.Sc. (Hospital Pharmacy) in 1998, both from Trinity College Dublin. In 2021 she completed an IMI Professional Diploma in Organisational Development and Transformation and commenced an employment-based PhD addressing Advanced Pharmacy Practice in collaboration with UCC and TCD academic supervisors.

Evelyn was instrumental in the development of a TUH training model for pharmacists in advanced clinical pharmacy delivery including collaborative prescribing. She is a lead tutor on the TCD MSc in Hospital Pharmacy programme and co-ordinator of the TUH APPEL fourth year and fifth year under-graduate programme. Her membership of hospitaluniversity research groups has facilitated six PhDs to date. Evelyn contributes to the development of advanced practice networks nationally, as founding and continuing Chairperson of the HPAI Cardiology Special Interest Group since 2011.
